



## Additions to the mirid (Hemiptera: Heteroptera) fauna of China, 2000–2006

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## **Abstract**

A list of Miridae from the Chinese fauna described, recorded, or revised since the 2003 list of mirids by B. Qi *et al.* is presented. Information about descriptions, figures, distributions, type specimens, examined materials, host plants and predation, and references is listed to guide further studies.

Key words: Miridae, Chinese fauna, taxonomic list

## Introduction

With more than 10,000 species (Schuh 1995), Miridae is the largest family, and one of the most diverse, in the hemipteran suborder Heteroptera. Qi *et al.* (2003) published a taxonomic list of Chinese mirids found or reported in scientific papers mainly from mainland China since the 1995 world catalog by Schuh (1995). Since then, many taxonomic papers have been published and more than 100 new and newly recorded taxa been found in the Chinese fauna. Here we present a list of the taxa described, recorded or revised from China since 2003, as well as some taxa whose descriptions were published during 2000 to 2003 but not included in the 2003 list by Qi *et al.* The present list includes 1 subfamily, 6 genera, and 123 species added to the Chinese fauna, and 44 revised taxa.

With these additions, there is now a total of 8 subfamilies, 23 tribes, 215 genera, and 840 species in the mirid fauna of China (see table 1.).
